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


Interior Regions

Priorities for the Department of the Interior, Region 3

- Make personal contact with Tribes, States and Stakeholders in Region 3 and use unified DOI operations to enhance partnerships and to more effectively address matters of mutual interest or concern
- Share expertise and resources to eliminate avoidable delay and meet all Departmental responsibilities respecting Superior National Forest Mineral Activities, Great Lakes Conservation, Permitting, and NEPA Streamlining
- Improve identification and resolution of conflicts in the following areas: Great Lakes conservation, linear infrastructure (e.g. pipelines, transmission lines, roads, etc.), Endangered Species Act consultation and permitting, and meeting the trust responsibility to federally recognized Indian Tribes
- Increase discussion, understanding, and progress on key priorities and tasks through tri-weekly discussions and project-specific partnerships

ESA Regulatory Changes

- Section 4 Listing
 - Foreseeable Future Clarified
 - Blanket 4(d) Rule Rescinded
 - Economic Impact Information Addressed
- Section 7 Consultation
 - Effects of the Action Defined
 - Adverse Modification Clarified



Northern Long Eared Bat listing litigation

- Northern Long Eared Bat listed as threatened in April 2015
 - Key threat: white-nose syndrome
- Final 4(d) rule designed to target the take prohibitions to those that provide conservation benefits for the species
 - Purposeful take prohibited everywhere
 - Incidental take prohibited in "white nose zone" only for tree removal under specified circumstances
 - Other incidental take not prohibited (e.g. mortality from wind turbines)
- In litigation, decision expected soon

NEPA Streamlining

- Secretarial Order 3355: EIS page and time limits
 - Generally, EIS must be completed within 1 year of issuance of a Notice of Intent and is limited to 150 pages.
 - Deputy Secretary's office may waive page/time limits for unusually complex projects
 - Solicitor's Office included in EIS Project Teams and briefing Review Team
 - Result: improved review times. BLM data shows that an EIS used to take an average of 200 days to clear once it was sent to Washington but now takes only 15-25 days.
- NEPA changes ahead? CEQ released draft NEPA regulations, currently open for public comment
